



Annual Delegate Meeting Summary-cont'd.

Board and Delegate Introductions—Members of each table introduced themselves.

New Literature Approval (Claudia M.)—The "Standards for Conference Approval" were read. The key changes and modifications to each document <u>based on comments from the fellowship</u> were listed and approval was requested afterwards for each item individually.

Board & Delegates voted **GREEN** on each item.

Central Office Update (Susan K.)—Susan shared office activities that she is focused on handling. Filling Literature Orders is a major item. There are some issues with recurring donations. Some credit cards are expired & need updating. We are changing to a new procedure which should simplify the process. It will be available via the website shortly. Recurring donations are critical to our organization and help with budgeting. CDs from this Convention will be burned and available for purchase today.

COSA Book Recap and Plans for Next Year (JoAn D.)—Everyone was invited to attend the two workshops being offered by the Book Committee. Questions from the group about the length requirement for submissions and updating the text after publication were addressed. More submissions are needed.

Q & A for Annual Report (Joey Z.)—The *Annual Report to the Delegates* highlights the work of the Board, Central Office, and Committees for their service year. Questions were addressed for the following topics.

Scholarships—The Convention Committee started with \$800 for scholarships and after great support from Seventh Tradition donations from the fellowship, was able to award 12 scholarships.

Tax Deductible Items—Service work is not tax deductible except in certain cases; talk to your tax accountant about your situation

Teleconferences—This year, for first time, remote call-ins to five sessions of the Convention will be available.

PayPal—We are moving from PayPal for more options and the ability to use credit cards and to avoid high fees.

Step Seven

Step Seven was the beginning of the big miracles for me. Oh, I'd had miracles before I humbly asked my Higher Power to remove my shortcomings. My relationships were already better, especially with my partner. I was more honest, more authentic, more transparent, than I'd ever been before COSA. I was spending less of my time trying to control the known world, and I was a little kinder and more patient.

But when I finally worked Step Seven, my Higher Power blew the doors off my recovery. The changes in my life prior to Step Seven centered around the fact that my *behavior* was better. After Step Seven, I *was* better. I tend to get healthier from the outside in--first my behavior improves, then my words improve, and finally my thoughts improve. And Step Seven brought my recovery home, bone deep.

The thing that makes a difference for me is my focus on that first word of the Step: "humbly." I had to do a lot of thinking, reading, and writing about what humility meant to me. It occurred to me that most of my troubles--and my shortcomings--came from low self-esteem, or arrogance, or pride, or something very un-humble. When I started studying humility, some things came together for me.

I am God's kid. As God's kid, I am something special. That idea didn't feel comfortable. And then my sponsor talked to me about everybody being God's kid, and everybody being special. I was one of a great group of recovering COSAs, and each one of us was special. I had to think about that for awhile. I had always been aware of two groups in school, at home, at work, and at play. There were the people I wanted to hang out with, and there was *my* group. When I got to Step Seven and did some thinking, I realized that somehow I'd become part of that select group I'd always wanted to join. They were okay. By default, I must be okay too. And then I did some looking around. Nobody in COSA seemed to be in that other, inferior group. We were a fellowship of equals, and it was all good.

I evaluated my thinking about humility. Maybe it was just a frame of mind. Maybe all it meant was that I was in right relationship with you people, and my Higher Power. Maybe humility just meant telling the truth to myself, about myself. I could stop trying to be someone I was not, knowing that I was good enough just as I was.

The very first word of Step Seven gave me a whole new context for the word "shortcomings." Maybe I could learn to accept my shortcomings, and quit trying to be someone I was not. Maybe it was okay to be a human being with strengths and weaknesses. Maybe all I needed to do was humbly ask my Higher Power to remove my shortcomings. I could relax! I didn't even have to figure out what shortcomings were the worst, or which needed to be removed, and how and when they needed to be removed. Maybe that was all my Higher Power's business, not mine.

Humility seemed to have something going for it. When I tried to practice humility, it was a whole lot easier for me to just be who I was, and to be okay with that. I could also hope for a better me, and I could let my Higher Power take care of that.

Ahhh, humility.

ISO of COSA Diversity Statement

- COSA Diversity is consistent with the Third Tradition of COSA, which states that the only requirement for COSA membership is that our lives have been affected by compulsive sexual behavior.
- The COSA Fellowship welcomes all genders, all varieties of relationship to the addict, all religious and spiritual preferences, all employment statuses, all marital statuses, all ethnicities, cultures, and languages. COSA does not discriminate on the basis of class, sexual orientation or gender identification, physical or mental challenges, race, financial status, or national origins.
- In COSA, we find hope whether or not there is a sexually addicted person currently in our lives.
- COSA Diversity is consistent with the First Tradition of COSA, which states that our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on COSA unity.

Annual Delegate Meeting Summary-cont'd.

2013-2014 Budget Q & A (Dorothy O.)—The proposed Budget was reviewed and Delegates will receive a copy of the Final Budget. If there is more than a 20% difference from the proposed Budget, a report will be sent in the spring for approval. Dorothy and Susan received a STANDING OVATION for Budget clarity this year. Linda P. discussed fundraising efforts for next year via the use of a raffle to help get more members to the Convention via prizes. Local fundraising efforts can be specified for whatever the group wishes—scholarships for group members and/or Board members and for the Convention itself. We had more requests for scholarships than funds allowed and a "Board Blurb" was sent out about the need and the fellowship was AWESOME with their donations.

Budget Approval for 2013-2014 (Dorothy O.)—Approval of the Proposed Budget was requested and Board and Delegates voted **GREEN.**

Concepts of COSA (Amy E., Claudia M., Dani S., Dorothy O., JoAn D.)—Members worked in groups using an assigned "Concept of COSA". They were asked to share how it can apply to the role of a Delegate and how to apply it to their home group or personal situations. Concepts Three, Four, Nine, Ten, and Twelve were reviewed and a member of each table shared key items from their group study with the audience.

Step Eight

I will never forget the day I sat down to make my list of those I had harmed. There it was in black and white. There was no denying it now. I was face to face with the reality of my wreckage of the past. All the names of people I had harmed were staring back at me. I remember being so high and mighty about my husband having to make a lot of amends, and now it was my turn. I realized I had a lot of repairing to do in my relationships.

It took me a while to become ready and willing to make amends to everyone on my list. I had so many questions about this process. What will I say? Do I have to make the amends in person? How will all these people react to my amends? With the help of my sponsor she walked me through all of my questions.

When I presented my list to my sponsor she said, "You forgot the most important person."

She explained I should put myself on the list first. I realized how much I needed to place myself on the list. Through all my years of codependency I had treated myself very poorly. I always put my needs and wants above everyone else's. I spoke unkind words to myself and professed many hateful statements toward myself. I expected perfection out of myself and berated myself for being unable to achieve it. I thought of all the times I believed lies and denied the truth I was living in. I understood that I had to be first on the list and I had to become willing to forgive myself and make amends before I could proceed down the rest of the list. It was a process, but with much prayer and help from my Higher Power I finally become willing.

With my list in hand I was finally ready to face my mistakes and make the amends I had needed to make for so long. I had fear about the process but I knew others had done this before me and if they could do it so could I.

Step Eight is a process, a journey of facing reality head on. It was worth making the list and becoming ready and willing to forgive myself and take responsibility for my actions of the past. Step Eight is the prerequisite for Step Nine; I needed to become willing before I could take the action of making amends. For me willingness was the key to Step Eight and with my Higher Power's help I found the freedom I was seeking.

Tradition Seven: Every COSA group ought to be fully selfsupporting, declining outside contributions.

Being self-supporting has several layers of significance in my recovery. First, it means supporting myself; I need to actively support my own life and my healing. This means being willing and taking action. It may be obvious to some, but for me it was something I had to learn. For a long time I hoped that someone or something would rescue me. I can enjoy the help and support of others, but they cannot do my recovery (or my life) for me – that is my responsibility. My Higher Power is always there for me, and I also need to do my part.

Another aspect of being self-supporting is being attentive to the balance of give and take in my relationships. If I am passive, allowing the other person to take all the initiative, make decisions, and carry the relationship, I am not being self-supporting. This type of behavior may feel comfortable for a while, but leaves me feeling helpless, beholden to others, and smothered. On the other extreme, if I am over-extending myself because I am driven by the desire to earn someone's love or acceptance, then I am not being self-supporting either. Even though my intention may be to help (or in feel in control), it may actually hurt the other person and the relationship.

What is healthy on an individual and relationship level also applies to the group. This is why it is important for me to help nurture the group, and also to rotate out of service positions when the time is right. I can support my group in many ways. The most obvious is giving money when the Seventh Tradition basket is passed. I can also lend support by offering a smile or extending good will. I can share my thoughts and feelings, listen intently to another recovering person, or help with set up or cleanup of the meeting space. I can be helpful to meeting servants, or take a service commitment. Each contribution, no matter how humble, brings healing for me and support for the group.

As a group, we are COSAs supporting COSAs. I take comfort knowing this, because this is one way we stay focused on our primary purpose – to recover and help others recover. By not accepting outside contributions, we aren't subject to compromises and obligations that even the most well-intentioned gift may bring with it. I am grateful that Tradition Seven keeps things clean, clear and simple. It ensures our precious autonomy as individuals, as groups, and as a fellowship.

Tradition Eight: COSA should remain forever non-professional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

I recently had the opportunity to study the Eighth Tradition with some fellow COSAs. We have been studying the Traditions and I have been learning and growing so much as a result of this, however, I must admit I was skeptical about studying the Eighth Tradition; it sounded kind of boring.

I tried to keep an open mind and knew I would benefit from whatever learning there was to learn as I had from the other Traditions we have been studying. As it always happens, exactly what I needed to learn was right there for me.

In studying the Eighth Tradition I made the connection that I will never be a COSA professional. In fact, there are no COSA professionals. One of the gifts of our fellowship is that we are all non-professionals.

Imagine if some of us were considered professionals and others weren't, how would we ever truly achieve COSA unity or find our group's conscience? Who would decide who qualified as a professional or who was labeled a non-professional COSA?

The gift of our fellowship remaining forever non-professional is that I am of equal standing with all of my fellow COSAs. I am no better or no worse than anyone else in COSA. I believe we are all equals in COSA and equal in the eyes of God. We are all perfectly imperfect, beloved children of God.

I have struggled often over the years with my character defects of comparing myself to others and believing I am either "better than" or "less than". When I was new in COSA I often felt "less than" because I had less recovery or I thought I was more messed up than others in the fellowship. Sometimes I felt as though I had nothing to offer the group if I hadn't completed the Step we were discussing. I have struggled at other times with my ego, judgment, and "stinking thinking" that I have the right answers or know what is best for others.

While I continue to use the Sixth, Seventh, and Tenth Steps around these character defects as they come up, here was a great reminder, built right into the Traditions, of humility and equality. A lesson for me in how to remember we are all experts in where our COSA disease has taken us and we are all we are all new to learning more deeply about this disease, how we have been affected, and the God of our understanding.

Shares from those who attend their first meeting are just as valuable for my recovery and growth as shares from those who have been in COSA many more years than I have. And, no matter how I may feel about myself on that day, my share is just as worthwhile a gift as anyone else's. My service is just as valued and my voice is just as important.

I was able to present two workshops of my own which went fairly well, although if I ever have to present again I've noted places in which I can tighten up and improve my presentation. Both of us made new contacts and were reminded of the power of empathy, acceptance, and inclusion that's provided within the fellowship. I urge anyone who may suffer from co-sex addiction and codependency to seriously consider attending a conference at some point during their recovery."

Open Service Positions for 2014 Convention

The Waves of Hope 2014 Convention Committee is Seeking More Committee Members

COSA's annual convention is the key event each year that connects our fellowships. The convention committee is comprised solely of volunteers and it takes a lot of us to coordinate and organize one!
